Dr. Robert Allaben finished his medical school training at WSU in 1956. Following the completion of his surgical residency training in the early 1960s, Bob joined Dr. Bill Carpenter in a very busy practice of general surgery at both the Harper Hospital and the Mt. Carmel Hospital (now Sinai-Grace Hospital). During these years he was one of the early surgeons to become involved in renal transplantation within Southeast Michigan and made important contributions to our understanding of renal physiology and the different types of rejection asso-



ciated with kidney transplantation. After Bill Carpenter retired in the late 1970s, Bob became a full-time faculty member in the department of surgery at WSU while continuing to provide surgical care at the Harper Hospital and the Mt. Carmel Hospital. Bob was an important part of the residency teaching program where he was able to transmit many of his "tricks of the trade" to surgical residents doing complex operations. He had an intense commitment to excellent patient care resulting in a very busy practice, as patients referred other patients to him. Bob was the first president of the Wayne State Surgical Society. Throughout his career and even during his retirement, Bob continued to be a tremendous supporter of the department of surgery and a great fan of the surgical residents. Many of the surgical residents recall how Dr. Allaben was a strong mentor in displaying excellent surgical technique, respect for patients, and respect for life.

One of those residents was Dr. Sandy Engwall (nee Sessions) who took advantage of the American College of Surgeons "National Doctors' Day" where ACS Fellows can pay special recognition for surgeons that had a significant impact on their career. Sandy wrote, "Bob taught me the elegance and beauty of surgery performed well and efficiently. His surgical expertise was legendary, and he was an excellent teacher. Dr. Engwall Dr. Sandy Engwall



finished her general surgical training in 1983 and then set up practice in St. Paul, Minnesota. She has had a very productive practice and a very productive personal life. Sandy's daughter, Abby, is now a surgical resident at Michigan State University and has most of her surgical rotations at the Sparrow Hospital in Lansing. PRODUCTIVITY

Dr. Larry Diebel (WSU/GS 1980/86) and Mr. David Liberati published the paper "Red blood cell storage and adhesion to vascular endothelium under normal or stress conditions: An in vitro microfluidic study". This was published in the Journal of Trauma and Acute Care Surgery this spring. These authors looked at the well-known phenomenon that administration of old red blood cells (RBC) may have detrimental effects in patients being treated with hemorrhagic shock (HS). This process may be associated with endothelial cell (EC) glycocalyx (GC) shedding. studied RBC solutions from fresh, less than 14 day, or longer than 21 day, storage on the effect of the endothelial cells and the RBC glycocalyx including the monitoring of RBC adherence Mr. David Liberati to human umbilical vein endothelial cell monolayers at variable shear

They demonstrated that the endothelial cell glycocalyx and RBC glycocalyx were reduced by hemorrhagic shock/reperfusion, by epinephrine, and by storage duration. They concluded that consideration of the integrity of the endothelial cell and RBC glycocalyx may guide future transfusion strategies in injured patients. Further study of this phenomenon may lead to different therapies to mitigate against the adverse consequences of prolonged RBC storage on the endothelium.

MIDWEST SURGICAL ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS WILLIAM C. CIROCCO, MD

The Presidential Address that Dr. Bill Cirocco (WSU SOM 1985) presented to the Midwest surgical Association this past summer (2018) has just been published in American Surgeon. Dr. Cirocco presented "Celebrating 60 years of the Midwest Surgical Association (MSA): Reflection on 'testa dura', old men, football, and la familgia!". This address, which covered many topics and described his career up to becoming the President of the MSA, is well worth reading. During his address, he

Bill also reports that his son, Andrew, is now in his second year of medical school in Pennsylvania. Incidentally, Bill expressed interest in being part of a team to commemorate the Wayne State University Department of Surgery and particular, Dr. Alec Walt who was an important mentor to many of the former residents who are now on the faculty or out in private practice.
