DFMPHS FAMILY MEDICINE RESIDENTS ON THE FRONTLINE FIGHTING COVID-19

On April 7, the Michigan Academy of Family Physicians published an online article specifically mentioning the hot spot of Oakland County where DFMPHS's own colleagues are working tirelessly to fight the COVID-19 battle at Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital.

Pierre Morris, MD, clinical assistant professor and residency program director for the Wayne State University / Ascension Family Medicine and Transitional Year residency programs was quoted in the article as saying, "All of our family medicine and transitional year residents are on the front lines in the fight against the COVID-19 virus in our hospital. Our residents have joined COVID-19 teams headed by our family medicine faculty physicians and have also ioined our hospital ICU COVID teams headed by our pulmonologists, providing direct care to the most critically ill patients, many of whom remain intubated. It is a daunting task that is persistently physically and emotionally draining, but our residents and faculty continue to confront this challenge daily. The COVID-19 virus has also affected our family medicine clinic practice, where our residents are conducting telemedicine visits for our patients who continue to need our care. We are essentially at

war against the ravages of this virus; it is truly an unprecedented public health emergency."

At the start of Michigan hospitals' influx of seeing patients with COVID-19, Dr. Morris, applauded volunteers saying, "We have current residents and now incoming residents from our recent Match who are volunteering to step up and help on the frontlines. Dr. Alicia Steele, one of our Urban Track residents, became very sick while caring for COVID patients while assigned to an inpatient COVID team. She immediately returned to directly caring for COVID-19 the day after receiving a negative COVID test result even though she had not fully recovered. She ultimately didn't want to let her team down during the peak of this pandemic. Sarah Farooqi MD, an incoming resident and current research assistant in the Wayne State Pathology and Psych departments, emailed me asking how she could help as well. One of our first-year residents volunteered to take the place of a PGY-3 resident assigned to a COVID team, to spare him since he has asthma and

could be at greater risk for complications. One of our chief residents volunteered to be our first family medicine resident on the COVID-19 team, stating he wanted to experience it so that he could help prepare future residents. We have additional residents who feel it is their duty as physicians to face this head on, directly on the frontlines."

Special thanks to the many DFMPHS physician and research faculty who have stepped up to call on favors from family, friends, and colleagues to donate the much needed PPE, specifically N95 masks, making special arrangements to have the items delivered to our frontline workers.

celebrated 'Women in Family Medicine.' She was one of the six influential women in family medicine chosen for this year's issue.



In the article, Dr. Markova shares what led her to medicine, namely, her love of reading, doing science projects, and getting involved in community organizations that helped people. Second to medicine is her passion about education. She has always

practiced medicine in an academic setting. She is quoted in the article as saying, "I feel very fortunate to have the opportunity to blend medicine and education into my professional career as a medical educator. This experience has provided incredible opportunities for impact, for gaining exceptional mentors, and for developing lasting relationships."

The article shares the department's success of rising to seventh nationally in the Blue Ridge report for National Institutes of Health Funding and its growth in the areas of public health, behavioral sciences, and health disparities under her leadership. It also recognizes her innovation initiatives for residents to acquire skills needed to provide high-quality, safe, effective,

and equitable care in the new healthcare environment.

Dr. Markova shared her thoughts about being a family medicine physician, "Family Medicine is at the heart of prevention, chronic disease management, and population health with large impact on healthier communities. As a physician, there is no greater honor than to be trusted with the most intimate issues of someone's personal health, their family, living conditions, and working environment.'



PUBLIC HEALTH WEEK RECOGNITION AND COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

The Department of Family Medicine & Public Health Sciences (DFMPHS) is the Wayne State University (WSU) sponsor for the Michigan Public Health Week Partnership (MPHWP), which was celebrated (virtually) April 15, 2020. Led by the Michigan Department of Health & Human Services (MDHHS), the Partnership is composed of professional organizations such as the Michigan Public Health Association and Michigan Association for Local Public Health, as well as academic partners including Michigan State and Grand Valley

State Universities, and the University of Michigan.

Community Health Awareness Group, Inc. (CHAG), a Detroit community-based organization, was nominated for a 2020 MHWP Hometown Hero Award for "HIV Prevention, Care, Substance Abuse and Health Care Services" by **Dr. Julie Gleason-Comstock**, and was voted by the Partnership to be one of eight state-wide awardees. CHAG is the largest minority AIDS Service Organization in Michigan. CHAG's focus is the African-American population of Detroit; however, it is increasingly providing substance abuse prevention services to Tri-

County (Wayne, Oakland and Macomb) adults. CHAG has a longstanding public health research and practice community partnership with DFMPHS, which includes the recent "Detroit HeartBeat" health education project funded by the Detroit Medical Center Foundation and the WSU Cardiovascular Research Institute, for which Dr. Gleason-Comstock was Principal Investigator. DFMPHS also volunteers with CHAG to provide public health leadership with DFMPHS Associate Professor Dr. Juliann Binienda who is on the CHAG Board of Directors.

established in 2014 by Jennell White, PhD. Dr. White, Assistant Professor in the Department of Pharmacology at WSU-SOM, is dedicated to exposing youth to careers in the health sciences.

"We are excited to be able to offer students the BCAP research experience this year in an online format," said **Dr. Jennell White.** "We are proud of the effort that went into providing a quality program while adapting to challenges presented by the current circumstances. There is a really great group of students this year and we are looking forward to a productive summer."

As in previous years, students will be matched with a faculty mentor and will complete a research project and

present their findings in a closing ceremony. Students will attend professional development sessions and lectures, and complete labs over video calls and on other digital platforms. After successfully completing the BCAP Program and presenting their research projects, students will receive a stipend and certificate at the closing ceremony on July 31, 2020.
