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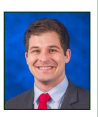

GENERAL SURGERY GRADUATES

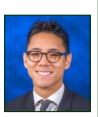
Dr. Matthew Georgis will be continuing his education with a Vascular Surgery Fellowship at our Detroit Medical Center.

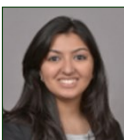

DR. SEE-TAO (JIMMY) YAO RECEIVES HIS FINAL ACCOLADE

Dr. Jimmy Yao was born in Canton, China in 1935 and received his early education there. He graduated from the National Taiwan University Medical School in 1961 and did his internship at the Cook County Hospital in Chicago through 1962. He then completed his residency at the Cook County Hospital in 1967. He moved to London, England, where he worked as a Research Fellow with Professor Irvine at the St. Mary's Hospital Medical School. Professor Irvine was a researcher known for his interest in vascular physiology.

Dr. Yao then returned to Illinois where he worked as a young faculty member at Northwestern University Medical School after which he returned to St. Mary's Hospital in London, where he served as a lecturer from 1968 through 1970. Jimmy then returned to the United States, where he became an instructor in the Wayne State University Department of Surgery and was very active at both the Detroit General Hospital (now Detroit Receiving) and the Veterans Administration Hospital, which at that time was in Allen Park. By the time he came to the WSU Department of Surgery, he had already written 28 peer reviewed manuscripts and had made 17 formal presentations with most of them being international.

While at St. Mary's Hospital, he received his Ph.D. in Physiology. His work dealt with complex vascular physiology and led to one of his great contributions related to the development and scientific validity of the ankle-brachial index, which has become a standard of care in patients being assessed for peripheral blood flow.

Following his stint in Detroit, he accepted a position in the Department of Surgery at Northwestern University where he applied the lessons from his Ph.D. to the clinical arena of vascular surgery and became a leader in this area. While at Northwestern University, where he stayed throughout the rest of his career, he published over 100 peer reviewed articles, 200 textbook chapters, 50 academic books, and was a frequent Visiting Professor, giving lectures about vascular surgery. He was a leader in the Society of Vascular Surgery and received all of the most important awards from that Society.

Dr. Yao is survived by his wife and partner of 55 years, Louise, and their three children. Cathy is a busy surgeon in Chicago; Pauline is a museum curator in Hong Kong; and John is a Jazz musician in New York. The widely different careers of his children are a reflection of the broad interests that Dr. Yao had throughout his life. Wherever he went, he was identified as a person who was friendly, helpful, supportive, and a treasure to be with.

DR. DEAN DALBEC RECEIVES HIS FINAL PROMOTION

Dr. Dean Dalbec was born on April 13, 1953 in Ironwood, Michigan and received his early training in the upper peninsula. After attending Northern Michigan University in Marquette, Michigan, he matriculated at the WSUSOM and graduated from medical school in 1979. Like all “Yoopers,” he was fond of outdoor sports, including hunting, fishing, and skiing. While in medical school, he scored quite high and decided that he wanted to be a surgeon and entered into the surgical program at WSU in 1979.

During his years in the surgical program, he was well liked by his fellow residents and attending surgeons. During these years, he married his bride, Holly, who was also in her residency. When their first child came along, the combination of his work hours and her work hours created a time crunch, and Dean made a decision to switch over to Emergency Medicine. He did his Emergency Medicine training at William Beaumont Hospital and following his training, he was an active faculty member there, at both the Royal Oak branch and the Troy branch for 40 years. He was also active in the community and served as Emergency Department Director in time of need at both the Saratoga Hospital in Detroit and the Crittenton Hospital in Rochester. Besides being a busy practitioner, Dean had a love of cooking and enjoyed having his friends over for special meals on many occasions.

Dean moved on to the next life on May 4, 2023. He died at his home in Shelby Township due to a longstanding disease, with his family nearby. Dean is survived by his wife Holly and his children, Dr. Kathleen Ziegler, Jason, Jarod, Alexander, Andrew, and many grandchildren.

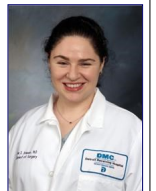

GRAND ROUNDS - 5/24/23

Each year, one of the Spring Grand Rounds session is dedicated to the “My Most Memorable Case” presentations, presented by the graduating General Surgery residents.

Dr. Laurence Lentz described, as his most memorable case, a patient who had a distal gastrectomy in China in 1988. The patient did well following this operation, which was a distal gastrectomy with Billroth II reconstruction. He developed symptoms of decreased ability to eat in the 2020s. This gradually became more severe, and workup demonstrated that he had a more proximal cancer. He then underwent a total gastrectomy and did well. Dr. Lentz described the different cell types that are associated with gastric cancer, and during the discussion, it was pointed out that distal gastrectomy done many years earlier for benign disease is sometimes associated with a “stump” cancer of the proximal stomach, which involves the distal esophagus and is extremely difficult to excise.

Dr. Joshua Kong described, as his most memorable case, his first appendectomy in a very obese patient who presented with acute appendicitis with walled off perforation. He described the insecurity that he experienced when making his incision and had to go down through many layers of fat in order to identify the fascia. He was supported in this operation by Dr. Anna Ledgerwood, and he humorously described how he had trouble splitting the muscles with the initial incision, only to have Dr. Ledgerwood show how you can split the muscles with two retractors. He described the many attempts he made in order to deliver the appendix, resulting in the mistaken delivery of the cecum, the small bowel, and again the small bowel, until his attending was able to reach in and direct him to the right area so he could deliver the appendix into the wound. He described the frustration experienced by his attending who commented during the closure, “I don’t know how to help you,” but eventually they got the wound closed, and the patient did very well.

Dr. Maseray Kamara integrated her presentation with her background, having grown up in Africa. She showed some of the traditional clothing, which was very colorful, with her friends and family members. She was proud to present her “Intern of the Year Award” and described the many ups and downs that are experienced during residency training. Early in her training, she had fears related to Covid and all of the terribly sick patients, many of whom died during this awful period. She emphasized how we all have to work together for the “greater good,” as was emphasized by Oprah Winfrey.

Dr. Jose Wilson Mesquita Neto, affectionately known as Dr. Wilson, described his experiences during the training. Dr. Wilson was a fully trained surgeon when he came into our program and desired to meet the criteria in order to practice hepato-biliary surgery in the United States. Dr. Wilson was involved in significant research during his residency and was able to present national papers at the Central Surgical Association meeting, the American Surgical Association meeting, and the society of Surgical Oncology. He also presented at the International Conference of the Surgery of Cancer with a paper dealing with hepato-biliary surgery. The interesting patient that he presented was a patient who was able to swallow surgical gloves and presented with high-grade small bowel obstruction with a small perforation. There

were a number of surgical gloves. He also pointed out that the patient failed the swallowing test when he was given a barium cookie. He also presented a number of other examples of people who swallowed foreign bodies and presented one patient who appeared to have a bent fork in the small intestine. He pointed out that when Dr. Anna Ledgerwood made rounds on this patient, she suggested to

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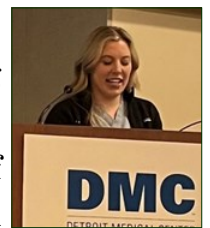

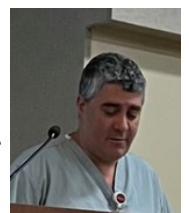
the patient that she really didn't swallow the fork because it wouldn't go beyond the pylorus. The patient giggled and pointed out that whenever they would come to take a picture, she would slip the fork into her ostomy appliance so that it looked like it was in the abdomen. Dr. Wilson also pointed out the difficulties that someone from a different country has when coming too the United States in order to practice their specialty here. He finished with a patient who went into a Coney Island restaurant and bought a hot dog, and when leaving the restaurant became short-of-breath, collapsed, and required CPR. He showed how the patient received CPR and developed a flail chest prior to being intubated when a 2-inch long segment of the hot dog was removed from the trachea. His presentation kept everyone awake.

Dr. Alyssa Stroud described the different experiences that she had during her five years of training. The first year dealt with putting out fires that appeared on her pager routinely. She described that in her second year, one of her early cases was a patient who had a crossbow injury to the thigh, which came over her pager as a TC1. During her third year, she got to do more cases but sometimes was frustrated with the impediments, such as having a patient undergoing drainage of a perianal abscess at the time when a gunshot wound to the abdomen presents so that someone else got to operate upon the patient with the gunshot wound. She described the excitement and reward of being a PGY-4 and being able to be the chief on certain services, and then the final pleasure, but also apprehension, of being a PGY-5 since "the buck stops here," and she was now responsible for making the correct decisions in patients with complicated problems.

Between the different presentations, Dr. David Edelman presented a number of awards to residents who did especially well in certain areas.



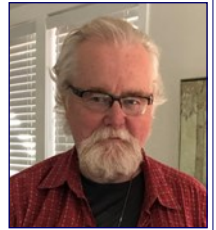

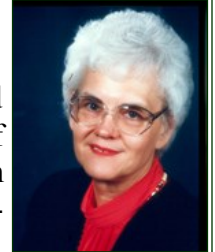


"EXCERPTS FROM LOG BOOK" - DOWN MEMORY LANE

7/30/71 - Staff: Dr. I.K. Rosenberg; Chief Resident: Dr. I. Asfaw

1. WB: GSW left upper quadrant abdomen with laceration inferior vena cava, third and fourth portion of duodenum, proximal body of pancreas, tangential laceration antrum of stomach, thru-and-thru perforation of left transverse colon, and thru-and-thru perforation ascending colon. Operation consisted of closure of lacerated stomach and lacerated duodenum and closure laceration left transverse colon and closure laceration inferior vena cava. There was exteriorization of laceration of ascending colon, and there was placement of a jejunal duodenal tube, a jejunal feeding tube, and closure of lacerated pancreas and a tracheostomy

7/31/71 - Staff: Dr. Lenaghan; Chief Resident: Dr. Sankaren

1. ES: Ischiorectal abscess with rectal fistula, treated with incision and drainage and sigmoid loop colostomy.
2. AJ: Acute appendicitis, treated with appendectomy
3. CW: GSW abdomen with multiple lacerations small bowel, treated with resection and primary anastomosis.

7/01/71 - Staff: Dr. Carrasquilla; Chief Resident: Dr. I. Asfaw

1. MR: GSW right upper quadrant abdomen with laceration of transverse colon, distal sigmoid colon, and mid-jejunum x6, treated with resection and primary anastomosis of jejunum and resection and anastomosis sigmoid colon and exteriorization of transverse colon laceration.
2. JA: Perforated gastroduodenal ulcer, treated with distal gastrectomy and gastrojejunostomy with tube duodenostomy and a tracheostomy.
3. LM: GSW right flank and right upper quadrant with thru-and-thru laceration hepatic flexure of colon, 2 cm stellate laceration edge of right lobe of liver, lacerations jejunum x6, and laceration of left common iliac artery and vein. Injuries treated with ligation of left common iliac vein, resection and end-to-end anastomosis of right iliac artery, resection and primary anastomosis jejunum, and exteriorization hepatic flexure colon.
4. RS: GSW right upper quadrant abdomen with laceration distal antrum of stomach, proximal jejunum x4, distal descending colon, and edge left lobe of liver. Injuries treated with closure of laceration of stomach, jejunum, and descending colon.

8/02/71 - Staff: Dr. Birks

1. MH: Ectopic pregnancy, treated with excision.

2. JJ: Foreign body right neck (broken needle from heroin injection), treated with removal.

8/03/71 - Staff: Dr. Z. Steiger

1. CM: Blunt trauma (jump from three stories) with fractures of the acetabulum, L4, sacrum, distal left tibia. There was also dislocation left arm, bilateral kidney contusions with gross hematuria, and partial paralysis at level of L3. The abdomen was rigid and tender, and he was guarding. We were concerned for intra-abdominal visceral injury. Peritoneal tap was positive for blood. Exploratory laparotomy found a large hematoma of sigmoid and rectal mesocolon, retroperitoneal and pelvic hematoma, and hematoma of bladder and base of small bowel mesentery and enlarged right kidney.
2. TR: Left gluteal abscess, treated with I&D.

8/04/71 - Staff: Dr. Benavides

1. JC: Perforated duodenal ulcer, treated with closure and omental patch.
2. VM: Perforated appendicitis but found free perforation of gallbladder with gallstones, treated with cholecystectomy.

8/05/71 - Staff: C. Lucas

1. RH: Perirectal abscess, treated with incision and drainage.
2. TB: Laceration left wrist with transection flexor tendons to third finger, palmaris longus, and extensor tendons to wrist and thumb. Injuries treated with repair of superficial branch of radial nerve and flexor and extensor tendons.
3. JL: GSW left upper quadrant of abdomen with laceration of stomach, tail of pancreas, splenic flexure of colon, and left diaphragm. Injuries treated with closure of lacerations of stomach, colon, diaphragm, and pancreas, and insertion of left chest tube.
4. FG: Laceration right palm with transection flexor tendons to second and third fingers, treated with repair of deep flexor tendons.
5. CM: blunt trauma chest, abdomen, and extremities with fractures following a jump (treated on 8/03/71), treated with tracheostomy.
